What is Transition Year in CBS?


One year school-based programme between Junior Cycle and Senior Cycle

Student Dimension	Description
Personal Growth	Students mature socially and emotionally over the course of the year, developing in areas that include health and wellbeing, autonomy, identity, empathy and leadership.
Being a Learner	Building on their previous experiences, students begin to develop as senior cycle students, embracing opportunities and strategies for learning that work best for the student now and into the future.
Civic and Community Engagement	Students make a positive difference in their schools, communities and society. They learn to act on their responsibilities and exercise their rights as local, national and global citizens in ethical and sustainable ways.
Career Exploration	Students explore diverse future pathways in a guided and coordinated manner, gaining first-hand workplace experience, and developing career-related competencies.





TY has allowed my son to mature, gain new skills and not have pressure of exams for 1 year. He has been able to gain work experience which has given him a new confidence.

Matured in the year, completed activities he hadn't done before. Enjoyed his work experience

He's enjoying the less structured environment & spending valuable time experiencing new life skills




I think that in our current co-vid environment that TY gives my son a chance to reevaluate his direction in what is or should be a relaxed year in order for him to grow as a person


My son has enjoyed all the programmes especially the work experience. I think it has given him an insight into different areas and possible opportunities to pursue re studies and future employment
